






### **MEET THE AUTHOR!** AUTHOR FOCUS: Maz Evans


#### Who is Maz Evans?

Maz Evans is the author of the WHO LET THE GODS OUT? trilogy of books series, which has sold to 19 countries worldwide and has received over 20 award nominations, including the Carnegie Medal and Waterstone's Children's Book of the Year. Her latest books include 'The Exploding Life of Scarlet Fife' and the first in a new spy series 'Vi-Spy: License to Chill'.









#### What was your favourite childhood book and why?

Like most children's authors, I was a massive Roald Dahl fan and to this day I love The Twits. But a book that really stayed with me was A Necklace of Raindrops by Joan Aiken, illustrated so beautifully by Jan Pienkowski. It's a collection of short stories, but the title story about a little girl who is gifted a magical raindrop necklace by her godfather, the North Wind, really stayed with me. So much so, in fact, that when I bought the book for my little girl thirty years later, I could still remember the story word for word!

Which of your books is your favourite?

This is such a tough question as, like my kids I love them all, just for different reasons! The one I'm most proud of is Simply The Quest, my second novel, because it was an absolute nightmare to write! It was two completely different books before I settled on the right one and I think I terrified my publishers that I had completely forgotten how to write! But I battled on and I got there in the end – and thankfully, my readers seem to love it.

Why do you choose to read? Or why bother? Or what is reading good for?

I used to think that reading was just something I really enjoyed, but as I get older and uglier, I realise it is essential for my wellbeing as a writer and as a very busy human! Reading takes you out of yourself and gives your brain somewhere to holiday while you figure out real life. Reading fills your head with stories, ideas and experiences beyond your own and makes you think about the world(s) you don't know. I love it. Can you tell...?

### LKS2 RECOMMENDATION!


The Caravan at the Edge of Doom by Jim Beckett






### BOOKS FOR SUMMER TERM 2! NON-FICTION RECOMMENDATION!

An Emotional Menagerie: Feelings from A to Z

#### by The School of Life

An Emotional Menagerie is an emotional glossary for children. A book of 26 rhyming poems, arranged alphabetically, that bring our feelings to life Anger, Boredom, Curiosity, Dreaminess, Embarrassment, Fear, Guilt, and more. The poems transform each emotion. Into a different animal to provide a clear and engaging illustration of its character: how it arises; how it makes us behave and how we can learn to manage its effects. Boasting a rich vocabulary, the poems also give children a wide variety of options for describing their feelings to others.
