
Risk Assessment

A quick reference Summary of Covid-Safe Working Practices for visiting music teachers (March

2021)

Visiting Teachers deployed to schools by Wigan Music Service will.....

not attend school if they display symptoms of COVID-19



engage with the Asymptomatic Testing Programme for front-line workers and carry our one or two self-tests per week (depending on timetable) and log their results on the NHS website. 'Evidence' of their negative test will be available to view on their mobile device when teachers attend school.

cooperate with track and trace systems in place in schools at point of entering school reception.

hand-sanitise on arrival and at intervals during their visit.

wear face-coverings in accordance with DfE guidance, public heath guidance and individual school policy. In primary schools coverings (not visors) will be worn in communal areas and when 2m distancing risks being compromised in the teaching situation.

maintain 2 meters distance from all pupils and staff at all times and will not compromise 'bubbles' by mixing pupils.

minimise surface contact and where this is necessary will use sanitising wipes to clean down after use (e.g. piano keyboard).

ensure that pupils do not share instruments or resources.

minimise the use of printed materials and handouts (pupils will have their own music books).

maintain good ventilation in teaching spaces, especially for singing and wind instrument activities.

utilise a portable transparent screen to help to maintain distance and minimise large droplet spread.

work with school to ensure quarantine of instruments where class sets are used weekly.

You can:

- Teach music to whole-class groups in schools; indeed the Department for Education expects schools to teach arts subjects (Restricting Attendance p.47)
- Welcome peripatetic (visiting) teachers in schools (ibid. p.48)
- Allow peripatetic teachers to move between schools without restrictions on the number of settings they visit per day or per week (ibid. p.48)
- Sing and play any and all combination of instruments in class, including woodwind and brass (ibid.p.49)
- The guidance prioritises social distancing for higher aerosol activities
- Teach individual and small group lessons, subject to a suitable space (ibid. p.50)
- Run after-school clubs in school as part of wrap around care, using school staff or outside providers, e.g. Music Education Hub staff (ibid. p.46)
- Run other out-of-school provision but only for vulnerable children, key workers' children, where attendance is necessary for parents to work or for home educated children (OOSS Who can attend your setting)

You cannot:

- Play or sing in "larger groups", which we understand to be larger than a class bubble (Restricting Attendance p.49)
- Use physical correction or allow contact between pupils, as either would compromise social distancing (ibid. p.47)
- Perform to a live audience (ibid. p.48)
- Run educational visits, including non-residential (OOSS Educational visits and trips)

We recommend:

- Observing social distancing meticulously for peripatetic staff, both from school staff and pupils
- Distancing as much as practicably possible for singing and playing blown instruments in class bubbles (although this may be relaxed for recorders and ocarinas, as they do not require significant volumes of air)
- Issuing books and copies of music to individual students for their exclusive use



For secondary schools and further education settings, staff should wear face coverings in all indoor environments – including classrooms – where 2m social distancing cannot be maintained during lessons. Face visors or shields should not be worn as an alterative to face coverings. They may protect against droplet spread in specific circumstances but are unlikely to be effective in reducing aerosol transmission when used without an additional face covering. They should only be used after carrying out a risk assessment for the specific situation and should always be cleaned appropriately.

Staff are advised to only physically meet with school staff if they are satisfied that doing so is consistent with government advice.

Staffs are asked to not touch or shake hands with pupils or school staff.

Instruments will only be used if safe to do so. A series of 'instrument free' resources for whole class instrumental work are available for use by classroom colleagues and by MS teachers either on their own or in combination with half classes to support social distancing and the possibility of delivering music lessons without instruments.

Instruments **Must Not** be shared between staff or pupils.

Hand-outs should not be given out but digital solutions such as projecting should be used. Teaching by rote will be a likely method of teaching and learning musical content.

Movement in the class should be kept to a minimum and within the procedures of the school

Music service staff that fall into the extremely vulnerable category should remain shielding at home. Schools given the option to invite the colleague to join a video conference type lesson to deliver remotely.

Freelancers advised to provide their own pocket hand sanitizer for use during their visit. Anti-bacterial wipes will be provided to all staff members.

All WMS Staff to be issued with a transparent portable shield to assist in social distancing and mitigate the risk of aerosols from speech, singing (small group / individual) and wind instruments. Shield to be sanitised between lessons.

Music service staff who live with clinically vulnerable people may attend work. Music service staff who live with people who fall into the extremely vulnerable should remain at home. Music staff should not seek to find pupils who do not attend. Instead, pupils should send for the next pupil where they are a part of the same class / bubble.	
When social distancing is not possible discuss alternative options with the School senior management and Head to Music Service. 2 metre rule applies in schools	
Pupil lesson times should be staggered for arrival and departure times to reduce contact.	
Spaces should be aired out as much as possible both during and between sessions.	
Measures to take when staff or pupils arrive at school unwell or become unwell whilst in school	
Pupils and staff who are sent home are advised to follow the staying at home guidance.	
Music service staff should inform school staff if they or a child becomes unwell. Follow the instructions of the school management.	
Whilst a child is awaiting collection, they will be moved, if possible and if appropriate, to a room where they can be isolated under supervision of a member of staff.	

Where it is not possible to isolate them, school		
staff have been advised to move them to an area		
which is at least 2 metres away from other		
people.		
Children that need to go to the bathroom while		
waiting to be collected are to use their bubble

The bathroom will be regularly cleaned and

	If instruments are maintained by MS staff whilst in school, they should be further quarantined before handing to pupils. Social distancing guidance should be followed when collecting or delivering instruments. Pupils should not be involved in the movement of instruments apart from their own individual allocated instrument. Hand washing or the use of hand sanitizer should take place regularly. Use of gloves should be considered. Staff will be issued with wipes and gloves. Case handles to be wiped after handling instruments. Any delivery of instruments into school should be planned to avoid high congestion times. Wind instruments Must Not be shared. If percussion instruments / keyboards are shared. This should be minimised (i.e. pupil uses the same instrument throughout the lesson), and instruments should be cleaned between use and sessions.
